

The Delaware & Lehigh National Heritage Corridor (DLNHC) was established by Congress in 1988 to preserve, interpret, and celebrate the five-county region's nationally significant history. The transportation route that once carried anthracite coal from mine to market takes shape, today, as a 165-mile multi-use trail and Smithsonian Affiliate.

Anthracite Region Wilkes-Barre to Lehigh Gap This region is named after the hard 'stone' coal mined here which fueled America's 19th Century Industrial Revolution. Today, it's the most forested region and the first to have a county with a fully connected section of D&L Trail.

Home to DLNHC Offices, the National Canal Museum, and one of the nation's only mule-drawn canal boats—this region is the most diverse in both its landscapes and communities. The points of interest in this region take visitors through vibrant cityscapes and provide ample opportunity for outdoor recreation and hands-on history lessons.

Delaware Canal Region Easton to Bristol With hundreds of historic sites, this may be the most iconic of the three regions. Here, the D&L Trail shares the Delaware Canal Towpath with the Delaware Canal State Park and parallels the Delaware River. Trail users can enjoy covered bridges and fieldstone houses as they ride, walk, and explore historic districts, villages, and farmlands.

Through public and private partnerships, the Delaware & Lehigh National Heritage Corridor connects people to industrial heritage, health and wellness, economic development, and nature and the environment.

The Corridor connects people to Eastern Pennsylvania's most enduring history. Along the way you'll find 19th century artifacts, the National Canal Museum, and a fully operational mule-drawn canal boat.
