Title: Mobile Workshop #1 – Transit & Trails Training

Speaker: Lehigh and Northampton Transportation Authority (LANTA), Coalition for Appropriate Transportation (CAT)

Description: Need a ride to the trail but don't have a bike rack? Worried about parking at crowded trailheads? Ever had a breakdown miles from home with no easy way back? Transit to the rescue!

This interactive mobile workshop introduces trail enthusiasts to the growing mobility options available through local public transit. Led by the Lehigh and Northampton Transportation Authority (LANTA) and the Coalition for Appropriate Transportation (CAT), participants will explore how transit can make trail access easier, safer, and more flexible.

The workshop begins with a tour of Bethlehem's new Walnut Street Garage, featuring bicycle-specific amenities, stops for LANTA's Enhanced Bus Service (EBS) lines, and the new CAT Bicycle Cooperative. Inside CAT's facility, participants will learn how to plan rides using trail maps, transit maps, and bus schedules while getting an introduction to safe and efficient transit riding.

LANTA staff will demonstrate how to identify bus stops, routes, and schedules, whether planning ahead or navigating an unexpected mid-ride emergency. Participants will also learn how to board a LANTA bus, pay fares, and load bicycles onto bus-mounted bike racks.

To put those new skills to the test, the group will board a live LANTA bus for a hands-on transit experience. Participants will practice riding the bus, requesting a stop, exiting safely, and retrieving their bicycles like seasoned transit riders. Bikes will be provided by CAT for demonstration purposes only.

Title: Mobile Workshop #2 – Historic Hotel Walking Tour

Speaker: Historic Bethlehem Tours | Historic Bethlehem Museums & Sites

Description: Learn about the 280-plus-year history of Bethlehem's unique beginnings starting in the early 1740s with a guided tour through the Moravian Church Settlements–Bethlehem World Heritage Site, and the Colonial Industrial Quarter along the Monocacy Creek.

Historic Bethlehem Museums & Sites (HBMS) interprets three centuries of the history and culture of Bethlehem by vividly telling the stories of Bethlehem's people through well-maintained original buildings and sites, rare collections that are available through exhibits and research, and illuminating educational programs. During the tour, HBMS will shed light on how local history has been leveraged into successful programming for residents and visitors, thereby providing an economic boon to region.

Title: Mobile Workshop #3 - Bethlehem Complete Streets Tour **Bring your own bike and helmet or use bike share*

Speaker: Corey Gray, City of Bethlehem

Description: The City of Bethlehem has made significant investments in its trail network to serve both local and regional needs, including improvements and expansions to the South Bethlehem Greenway, and D&L Trail. However, like many communities in Pennsylvania, gaps remain between these trails and the neighborhoods, business districts, and daily destinations they are intended to serve. This session explores how the City of Bethlehem is using Complete Streets principles and a Safe System approach to bridge that gap and integrating trails into vital components of the City's transportation network. By aligning these planning efforts, the City intends to improve mobility for all users, while addressing key "last mile" connections between communities and regional trails. Participants will ride on a guided bike tour of the City, stopping at recent improvements, ongoing problem areas, and future projects. Bikes and helmets will

be provided to the first 20 registrants; all other participants must bring their own bike. Bike Police escorts will be provided.

Title: Mobile Workshop #5: Walking in the Shoes of History - Easton Silk Mill / Historic Easton Cemetery

Description: In the 19th century, many American cemeteries were designed not only as burial grounds but also as proto-parks—spaces for walking, picnicking, and leisurely strolls. With 85 acres of land, the Historic Easton Cemetery is Easton, Pennsylvania's largest greenspace, acting as a sculpture garden, an arboretum and a place for recreation, mindfulness, reflection, and community. Join us as we travel from the revitalized Simon Silk Mill, along the Karl Stirner Arts Trail, to the Historic Easton Cemetery. Our tour will tell the story of the Lehigh Valley, and the nation, by remembering those interred there, including George Taylor, a signer of the Declaration of Independence. **(Route includes stairs up a hill, some incline, we walk on flat paved and gravel sections. We'll move at a social pace.)**

Description: Discover how the completion of the 750-mile Empire State Trail has benefited New York's economy, environment, and public health. This session highlights key findings of the Empire State Trail Economic Impact Report from Parks & Trails New York: 9 million+ annual visits, multi-billion dollar visitor spending, and substantial job creation. We'll examine how trailside "Trail Towns" are capturing this revenue through tourism and infrastructure, proving that greenway investments deliver a high-yield return for local and state economies.

This session explores how the four component sites of the transnational Moravian Church Settlements World Heritage Site (Bethlehem PA; Herrnhut, Germany; Christiansfeld, Denmark; Gracehill, Northern Ireland) each use walking and trails as heritage interpretation, offering American trail planners rare comparative models from Europe and a case study from Bethlehem's own Delaware & Lehigh National Heritage Corridor.

Description: In the 50+ years since CNJ discontinued passenger service to Easton, the property has been the subject of plans for everything from short line rail to active transportation. In this session, representatives from a partnership between the City of Easton, Greater Easton Development Partnership, and Trust for Public Land will discuss efforts to redevelop the unused rail structure into an elevated park connected to regional trail network (Two Rivers Trailway and D&L).

Over the last decade, Chester County completed a series of trail plans that built a foundation for investment in its public trail network.

Description: Meetings, events and other gatherings such as summits are a part of our daily lives. As organizations whose missions are to conserve and protect the environment, incorporating sustainable practices into these events and our daily activities is an essential business practice. Learn how DLNHC went single-use plastic free for their largest fundraiser of the year and pick up ideas to incorporate sustainable business practices into your daily operating procedures.

You will also discover how "active placemaking" transforms unexpected sites—even active compost centers—into thriving community hubs. Using our weekly 5k and bike race series, Fifth Street Cross and RunSpringa, as a model, we demonstrate how to layer community recreation over functional utility sites. Learn the logistics of managing "co-existence" between municipal operations and public events, and how to maximize the return on public land to boost local quality of life without expensive capital construction.

Description: This session presents the Bushkill Creek Greenway master plan in Palmer Township, a 5.1-mile, 114-acre corridor shaped by climate pressures of flooding, karst geology, quarrying, and invasive species. Developed through robust community engagement and multidisciplinary analysis, the plan advances trails as climate infrastructure through dam removal, riparian restoration, and long-term stewardship strategies that build ecological resilience and support ongoing community care of the watershed.

A checklist of items will be presented of the buyer's due diligence in fee simple acquisitions and easements (conservation and/or trail). Building off of her knowledge and experience in open space, parks, recreation, greenways, and trails, Sherry will provide a technical aspect of land purchases, deed restrictions, and Covenants that run with the land in perpetuity as a toolbox.
